Pictured left to right are Thacien, Jean-Baptiste, Winifred, Brigette, Marguerite, and Clementine. These six members of the ZOE "Brave" working group are holding the prayer cards St. Luke's distributed so we could pray for each of them over the past year. Do you have one of them?

Jean-Baptiste (second from the left in group picture)

When St. Luke's Hope Companion team first met Jean-Baptiste in February 2016, he had malaria and had not eaten in 2 days. A year later, we were relieved to find his malaria is cured, and he is now attending school part-time. His three siblings are now able to attend school as well. Selling wood for income allows Jean-Baptiste to provide several meals a day for his family and to pay for all of their school fees. Although things are looking up, he still has a long way to go. Unfortunately, his grandfather, with whom he lived, died this past year and his uncles are trying to throw him and his siblings out of the house. ZOE staff are aware of this situation and our funds will help to secure a housing grant and a solution to this crisis for him and his family.



Brigette (fourth from left in the group picture)



Last year when St. Luke's met Brigette, she was 15 years old and all alone. Sadly, she had lost both parents as a baby. But this year, in 2017, she shared she is no longer alone because she now has friends in her ZOE working group, Brave, who are her "family." In addition, ZOE support and training has allowed her to manage several small projects, thus providing a steady source of income to support herself. One of these projects involves selling tomatoes, avocados, eggplants, and onions in the marketplace. Brigette remembers telling the St. Luke's team last year that before ZOE, she often cried. Now, she says she doesn't cry anymore because being a part of the Brave working group makes her happy!

Marguerite (second from right in the group photo)

In 2016, Marguerite shared how she and her siblings had struggled since the day she was born. Because their father had mental health problems, they were shunned by many of their villagers and were mockingly called "foolish people." Marguerite, who was cruelly called "mad girl," was taken advantage of because of her family's status and paid lower than normal wages. A year later, we are happy to report that Marguerite is now selling wholesale produce in the marketplace. She raises animals, which provide an additional source of income, and maintains a small personal garden.



Clementine (far right in the group photo)



In February of 2016, when the St. Luke's team first met Clementine, she had lost an eye and was in danger of losing her second eye. The team also learned from her that her son, while a product of rape, was her biggest blessing. Thankfully, over the past year, with ZOE's help and medical intervention, her eye was saved! In addition, Clementine introduced this year's team to her beautiful son, Eric! Currently, Clementine is working on establishing her small businesses, and is now able to feed her son. Through ZOE, Clementine's dream that her son return to school, has been fulfilled. He is, once again, a student!

The incredible changes in the lives of these children, who were able to look people in the eye when the team visited in February, are typical examples of how ZOE and the Brave working group have enabled once desperate orphans to become healthier, food secure, accepted, more confident, and successful business people!
